I have published three books: a scholarly translation of Vladimir Soloukhin's Время собирать камни, an edited collection of essays extending Mikhail Bakhtin's thought into interdisciplinary areas, and a scholarly translation of Vladimir Solovyov's religio-philosophical treatise Философские начала цельного знания. Му current book project is a two-volume biography of Rachmaninoff, titled *Cross Rhythms of the Soul*. An additional ongoing area of my research involves the relations between the Roman Papacy and Moscow Patriarchate.

Recent Events of Interest

The Conference "The Varieties of Russian Modernity: Rethinking Religion, Secularism, and the Influence of Russia in the Modern World" took place from June 7-9, 2013, at the Russian Presidential Academy of National Economy and Public Administration in Moscow. This conference devoted to the discussion of questions concerning interdisciplinary theoretical approaches to religion, secularism and modernity brought together scholars and experts in the humanities and social sciences from the United States, Canada, Russia, and various European countries. The conference's primary focus was on rethinking religion and secularism in the history of Imperial, Soviet and post-Soviet Russia; with respect to the Russian-Jewish experience and other religious minorities; and with respect to twentieth-century Russian emigration; in part in order to uncover new understandings of Russian influence in the modern world.

Member Activities

Alexander Angelov College of William and Mary William

- 1) My article, "In Search of God's Only Emperor: Basileus in Byzantine and Modern Historiography," is accepted for publication in the *Journal of Medieval History*. It re-evaluates the scholarly convention in the field (and beyond) that the Byzantines reserved the title only for their own rulers (the only exception being the Persian shah) and shows that they ascribed it quite freely. Numerous foreign rulers from northern Europe to Arabia received the title. This is important not only for Byzantinists interested in titular traditions, but also for scholars of Christianity who have traditionally insisted on the Byzantine basileus' exclusive Christian sacred rights. The notion of the Byzantine monarch as "divine represen tative on earth" and caesaropapism are largely grounded on the assumed Byzantine exclusive claims to the title.
- 2) I am working on a book manuscript that investigates foreign rulers' conversions to Byzantine Christianity from the 4th to the 9th century. To my knowledge, it is the first comparative monograph on the foreign elites' conversions. I emphasize the Byzantine perspective and explain the multiple ways in which the Byzantine historians themselves represented the process of religious change. The results are surprising as we find that they did not seem to be as preoccupied with foreign conversions as we have previously thought. In most of the occasions, the Byzantine imperial officials were involved only passively. The narratives of the events, too, developed and changed in accordance with the particular political and cultural context of the given Byzantine historian.

In 2012-2013, I published a review of Scott Kenworthy's book *The Heart of Russia: Trinity-Sergius, Monasticism, and Society After 1825* (SEEJ, Vol. 56, No. 4, 2012), as well as a review of the book *Brief Lives: Fyodor Dostoevsky* (Hesperus Press' "Brief Lives" series) by Anthony Briggs (SEEJ, Vol. 57, No. 1, 2013). My article "Veshch' u Dostoevskogo: Poniatii i rol' bytovykh predmetov v sozertsanii potustoronnego mira" will appear this fall in the collection *Veshch*: *Metafizika predmeta v literature, izobrazitel'nom isusstve, teatre, muzyke u kino.* Apollon Publishing Society, St. Petersburg. Currently I am working on a project examining Nikolai Leskov's use of hagiography.

Roland Clark Eastern Connecticut State University

Roland Clark was appointed as Assistant Professor of Modern European History at Eastern Connecticut State University starting in Fall 2012. He has recently published two articles on theology and nationalism in early twentieth century Romania in Nationalities Papers and has a critical study of the nationalist presuppositions in Fr. Dumitru Staniloae's early work forthcoming in *Studii teologice*. His translation of Fr. Staniloae's *The Holy Trinity: In the Beginning there was Love* (Brookline, MA: Holy Cross Press, 2012) appeared last year and he is currently working on a collaborative translation of selections from Gala Galaction's Journal (1900-1957).
